





- Investigate each college: Organize the information so you can compare colleges
- Narrow your list down to a few "dream" schools, "possible" schools and "safe" schools



STEP 5: COLLEGE VISITS

- The only way to really get the feel of a campus is to visit a school
- Many schools will offer housing and possibly airfare
- Juniors are allowed 2 college visits per year as activity absences
- Online College Visitation Request Form– 2 weeks prior to visit; Printable Verification form during visit
- •No absences in May or during school events
- Only 2 students allowed to go the same day, same campus





These 27 credits meet the minimum requirements established by Southwest Covenant Schools and the State of Oklahoma for a college preparatory diploma. SWCS highly recommends that any student who desires to compete for academic merit scholarships consider taking an advance math and an upper level computer course. Algebra 1 and Computer 1 taken in eighth grade will count toward graduation credit requirements, but the grade will not be included in the cumulative GPA. Students placed on an accelerated math track in 8th grade must take an advance math course.

- Valedictorian honor goes to student with the highest GPA
- Salutatorian goes to students whose GPA is 3.85 or higher

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

RESEARCH UNIVERSITIES

- Oklahoma State University¹ Score a 24 ACT/1160 SAT² or 1090 SAT³ or have a 3.0 GPA and rank in the top 33 percent of your class or have a 3.0 GPA⁴ in the 15-unit core and a 21 ACT/1060 SAT² or 980 SAT³.
- University of Oklahoma⁵ Score a 24 ACT/1160 SAT² or 1090 SAT³ and have a 3.0 GPA or rank in the top 50 percent of your class or have a 3.0 GPA and rank in the top 25 percent of your class.

• PUBLIC LIBERAL ARTS UNIVERSITY

 University of Science and Arts of Oklahoma - Score a 24 ACT/1160 SAT² or 1090 SAT³ and have a 3.0 GPA or rank in the top 50 percent of your class or have a 3.0 GPA and rank in the top 25 percent of your class or have a 3.0 GPA⁴ in the 15-unit core and an 22 ACT/1100 SAT² or 1020 SAT³.

REGIONAL UNIVERSITIES

Score a 20 ACT/1020 SAT² or 940 SAT³ or have a 2.7 GPA and rank in the top 50 percent of your class or have a 2.7 GPA⁴ in the 15-unit core.




SCHOLARSHIPS

OK Regents Academic Scholars Program

- Scholarship for attending an Oklahoma college or university
- Up to eight-semesters
- Amount depends on the school
 - Ex) OU/OSU/TU ~ \$5500
 - 4 year college \sim \$4000
 - 2 year college \sim \$3500
- Requirements: Total Sum of ACT scores = 135
 - National Merit or ACT at/above 99.5% automatically qualified
 - Can also be nominated by the university smaller amount







SHOULD I TAKE COLLEGE CLASSES IN HS?

Save \$\$\$\$\$

- For example, dual credit course here at SWCS costs \$200 for the entire 3 credits and no additional fees.
- In comparison, our local community colleges cost around \$140 per credit hour for tuition and fees.
- Seniors can receive up to 18 credit hours tuition waivers if you take a college course in the summer.
- Finish earlier which saves money
- Caution: Take courses that are general requirements for most degrees. If you are unsure, contact the college or university of choice to see if it will transfer. When transferring credits to another college, a syllabus is useful to demonstrate content covered.
